Notes from the Farm

During these times of lockdown & tiers etc., it would be easy to think that life on the farm is more difficult. Well slightly, but everything has to keep going, feeding animals, planting & harvesting crops and all the jobs in between.

Food production cannot stop or even be reduced with such a large population to feed but there are many challenges facing us, not least of all the politicians who are trying to appease many pressure groups surrounding the food industry. What they don't see is putting more restrictions on food producers could lead to a huge problem with a shortage of food! Having seen panic buying in supermarkets during the pandemic when there actually was plenty for everyone can you imagine the chaos if the shelves were empty because farmers had stopped producing? The squabbling between vegan, vegetarian, pescatarian, meat eaters and others would rapidly disappear if there was little choice or the quantity of food diminished, as Confucius said" Man with full belly have many problems, man with empty belly have one!"

Another and more worrying problem for food production is climate change. In hotter parts of the world, shortage of water and the rise in temperatures is destroying crops and reducing yields. On a lighter note, we have recently been blessed with another grandchild, Oliver, a very real sign that proves life goes on and the future of our family farm will be in good hands for another couple of generations. It is these younger generations who have the passion for the environment and will continue to look after the land.
