#### **Spring Watch**

I was once advised by a wise old farmer that to make a small fortune in farming you need to start with a big one! The only problem is we and people who would like to start in farming don't have a large fortune, in fact it is virtually impossible to get started in farming without subsidising the farm with another job, unless of course you are a celebrity or business person who has made a fortune elsewhere. In our case it has taken 5 generations and 100 years to get to where we are today and still we are only making a living. My Great Grandfather started with a blacksmiths shop, about 10 cows and approximately 20 acres of land, the family built it up to 750 acres and 500 head of cattle the point being he could make a living from a fraction of the land and livestock that I and son Jack have today but Gt. Grandfather didn't have the burden of paperwork, regulations and anti farming propaganda that we have today. When I was a lad there were at least 10 farmers and 20 -30 farm workers living in Malty le Marsh now I could count on one hand those that are left in the village. Why is this? Farming has been squeezed into near extinction by the consistent drive for cheap food. The evidence is there for all to see from supermarkets dictating the size, shape and price of everything on their shelves to shortages because farmers are cutting back or stopping production altogether due to

I have been been watching recent wildlife programmes on TV and yet again farmers are being blamed for the reduction in wildlife. What I and other farmers have seen is that there are more predators in the Wildlife. Only last week I saw a buzzard feeding on a hare it had caught being watched by 16 Magpies waiting for the leftovers. A neighbouring farmer also saw a buzzard attack a Barn Owl on the wing, nature adapts to survive and things are happening that we haven't witnessed before. I think it is the smaller wildlife that is suffering due to the proliferation of the larger animals e.g. deer, badgers, foxes and buzzards which we see much more on the farm.

On a more positive note we are moving out of winter into spring with warmer, brighter days when the cows and calves will be able to go out to grass and crops will really start to grow. Cattle prices are holding up well due to a shortage in national production, but wheat, barley and oilseed rape prices have fallen around 30-40% due to better global yields. This proves very difficult in making decisions on the farm as we have to plan so far ahead, it's a bit like playing poker but takes much longer!

Enjoy the spring and lets hope it helps with cheaper energy bills during the warmer months.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting 2023lk**

The last year has to me, one of a degree of sadness and frustration. Sadness of Phillips funeral on 25<sup>th</sup> March. The loss of someone who worked hard for the community following his manta of making the most of today because tomorrow it will piss down.

The frustration is with the attitude of ELDC, especially the planning department. Having attended one of their meetings and viewed others on utube, it is patently clear that our comments on planning applications are ignored. The committee discussions are in extreme, members simply accepting the planning officers recommendations. Thus the caravan site at Rose Marie was promptly passed in December despite numerous written objections. The committee seemed impressed by the provision of tactile paving enabling partially sighted people to cross the safely! I would thank Helen Cooksey for her efforts. The Parish meeting in July saw some 46 residents raise their concerns, all to no avail. We were also asked to comment on a hedge removal in September. Several months later Graham enquired what the outcome was. He was told ELDC could do nothing because it wasn't protected. One wonders why we were asked. The saga of foot-way light 20 is further evidence. It was clearly beyond the powers that be to connect the new light when the column was erected. Thus over 2 years later the light is still not working.

We have held 5 meetings during the year. Graham has again been very efficient in promptly pursuing matters despite meeting several brick walls. Our sincere thanks for your efforts and patience. I also thank my fellow Councillors for their help and support in particular Brenda my Vice Chairman. Thanks also to Sandra Harrison and Noi Sear for your regular attendances. We do appreciate hearing from you and following up on our concerns at County and District. Sadly the Garden Competition WA cancelled because the judge was unable to come until it was to late. He promises to ensure its carried out in good time this year. It was also sad to lose the Post Office facility at Oham Lakes and perhaps with more impact the news paper service. The brick building near the Crown was demolished in August. It is unlikely the post box that was in it will be replaced. Despite losing these facilities ELDC still classify our village as medium and will continue to do so until a revue is carried out, in the distant future. At least we now have a farm shop. Pipa and Ben Williams selling fresh vegetables and plants at Eastfield Farm. The long running confusion about the ownership of the structure on the bus shelter was finally solved by an eagle eyed resident in December. Anglian Water accepted it was theirs, and their proposed compensation for the 14 months it was there, has been agreed.

The Police camera van has continued to appear on a regular basis. I am pursuing funding for the village sign project that we launched in 2016, with GDF Community Partnership. Very early stages at the moment. We also continue to administer the Anne Bolles Educational Foundation. There were no applications for support at the AGM in November. I thank John Alldridge for continuing to produce his excellent News Letter and the helpers who deliver them. Thanks also to Anthony for his regular column giving a clear insight into farming life. In conclusion thanks also to John Clark for auditing our accounts and to Robert Aldridge for his work in the village in keeping the grass tidy and the footpaths clear.
