

Autumn Watch

This year's harvest has been challenging to say the least! Rain, wind, more rain and more wind! We finally finished harvest when it dried up in early September. We are still drying the wheat in the shed a month after harvest and waiting for the price to rise as it is currently £100 per ton less than last year against higher input cost of fuel, machinery etc., The good side of all the rain is the grass, the cattle have summered well as the grass has grown well meaning the cattle have grown well. The beef price held up because apparently there is a shortage of cattle. Ours will soon be coming back to the yard for their winter housing so we are busy preparing the crew yard which takes longer every year as the buildings are now getting old and in constant need of repair.



As we start the planting and growing of crops again I ask "How do you attract pigeons from a 10 mile radius?" Well apparently you just need to sow Oil Seed

Rape!! The day the tiny plants appear through the soil the pigeons do their best to eat every single plant and if they don't get them then the 'Flea Beetle will!! We used to be able to use a seed dressing on the Oil Seed Rape to protect it from 'Flea Beetle' but this was banned by the Government. We've managed to keep growing the crop but with varying success. Now the 'Flea Beetle' has established itself so well that it almost impossible to grow Oil Seed Rape, this years thousands of acres have been destroyed already and have left farmers looking for an alternative break crop The result of this is that processors are buying their Oil Seed Rape from Europe where the seed dressing is still being used (so much for a level playing field).

These kind of problems don't just apply to Oil Seed Rape. Dairy products, meat products and fruit and veg production is being exported abroad because successive governments have failed to support British Farming just when we need to be more self sufficient in this more unstable world.

We recently went to the Lincolnshire Artisan Market at Stourbridge Estates near Baumber which proves there are many good local food and drink producers (craft too) in our county. Many of the stalls were sold out hours before the event was due to finish which shows good quality food is always popular. I believe we should support these small local businesses as the produce is (in my opinion) much better than the factory mass produced stuff that fills the supermarket shelves and the income that gets stays in the local economy.

Finally, our family 'herd' grew over the summer when in the middle of harvest Jack & Harriet welcomed their 3rd child, Rueben. I wonder if he will be into farming? Despite all the difficulties it can be a very rewarding way of life. *Anthony White*.

Goodbye Landlines

Since the advent of the mobile phone the guidance has been "do not rely on a mobile phone to operate in an emergency" Providers are now moving over to a new digital service whereby the telephone runs off the broadband system rather than the original land-line



system which has worked so well for many years. One of the problems with the digital system is that if there is a power cut or the broadband is down it is not possible to make calls, including

999 calls. It is now recommended "that a mobile is available always,kept charged, for use in an emergency situation". Ironic or what? Another problem is that some telecare and burglar alarms will not work on a digital system so replacement and obviously expense is involved. Where no broadband connection to the premises is present the situation is uncertain.
